...A new way to share precious study resources

For more than a quarter of a century we have been working with Book-Link International, Inc. in Kentucky to collect and ship Bibles and Christian study materials to seminaries and Bible schools all over the world. Now we are also shipping Bibles and Christian study books from the North Carolina Baptist Men Missions Camp in Shelby, North Carolina. Ted Alexander, FBE's North Carolina Resource Director, is leading the project. If you have been in ministry, led a church library, or taught Sunday school, you have collected and used precious study materials that you may no longer need.

This is your way to make them available to Christian leaders around the world who are hungry for fine study helps.

Students in other countries often use English as a common language when



they gather to study, so your resources can be used in many places.

People ask why pastors and church leaders in other countries don't just get on the Internet to find all the resources they need. There are several reasons. First of all, they can't afford it. Some

> don't even have it available in their areas. And those who can get on line have a hard time identifying the reliable sources. Pastors and other church leaders who have families to support, have full time jobs, and serve their churches on the side have neither the time or the money to walk into the village and pay for access to a computer at an internet café when they are preparing sermons or need to find answers to church related questions.

Dr. Les Hill, our FBE President, and a former missionary seminary President, selected 312 of the books to send to Thailand's Baptist Theological Seminary in Bangkok.

Dr. Hill said, "Recognizing the language and cultural differences between Thailand and the Philippines, I [also] set aside some books for the Philippines."

Book-Link is able to help with \$300 toward shipping these books, but cannot cover the whole cost estimated to be between six and seven hundred dollars. 

Teaching in Nicaragua

The sounds of happy children on the playground, the noise of teachers calling out to rowdy students, the smells of a hot meal being prepared all brought to mind my own classroom



experiences and seemed quite normal. The difference was that these were children playing in the dirt with a stick and a can; the teachers' voices

that I heard were speaking Spanish; and the hot meal that was being prepared would be the ONLY meal most of these children would have that day!


The sounds and smells that I experienced were in Nicaragua, the second poorest country in the Western

Hemisphere, lagging only behind Haiti in that distinction. Over the last ten years, I have served as leader of more than ten mission trips to this beautiful country that has captured my heart. Our mission teams have prepared and served food to children who live in a dump; we have played with children at a small Christian school; we have built churches and

held Bible schools in the dirt; we have delivered clothing, rice and beans, and hygiene items to remote villages accessible only in the dry season; and we have brought Christmas gifts to children who would receive nothing otherwise. Some of us have built houses where families live in corrugated tin and cardboard houses. And we have shared our testimonies of the love of a personal Savior who gives hope to the hurting!

As I prepared for a recent mission trip to work at a small Christian school in Nicaragua, I was able to convince a retired assistant school superintendent who is a member of my church to go with our team so he could offer workshops for teachers.

We closely coordinated our efforts with the school principal and asked how this well-qualified team member could help evaluate, instruct, and offer encouragement to the teachers who had very limited educations themselves. Our efforts were rewarded with enthusiastic approval by the faculty and with extreme gratitude for the practical bulletin board and classroom supplies that we brought with us. They loved the fact that this welleducated team member observed each class and

offered positive encouragement for their simple efforts. They were grateful that she taught them classroom management procedures for classes that number far more than we have in American schools in crowded, hot classrooms with no supplies. They loved the fact that by the end of the week, each of them felt encouraged, strengthened, and appreciated. In fact,

appreciation was such that on the plane ride home, the team member started talking about bringing a GROUP of educators back to Nicaragua the next August to work oneon-one with the teachers at this school.

Education efforts in Nicaragua are difficult,

especially in the many poor villages where people have nothing and



struggle just to find food for their family members. Many families can't send their children to school because they are needed to care for younger siblings or to earn money to feed others in the family. Teachers receive meager compensation for their efforts and usually are not very well trained. For our team to be able to provide one-on-one encouragement and

training was looked upon as a "dream come true" for this little school and its employees.

So we are preparing a team that will go back. Some who cannot travel are preparing special teaching aids.

Others are collecting bulletin board supplies that are no longer used. Still more have pledged to pray as we prepare to train, encourage, and nurture those who envision a better future for the children of this beloved country.

As we look forward to our next trip in August with Team NEAT (Nicaragua Education and Teamwork), I

wonder how many other teachers there are out there who might be willing to spend a week or more helping in simple ways to encourage our fellow teachers around the world? Our Second Year and New Class

As we walk to the school, not knowing exactly how many teachers we will have, we prayerfully reflect on the mission God has given us in this small, rural town in northern Colombia. The mayor has been working hard to improve the town's infrastructure and schools. His goal is shared passionately by the local Secretario de Educación.

When we approached them about teaching English to the district's English teachers, we were met with open arms.

And now our team is on the ground headed to start a week's worth of lessons and activities. We have not yet seen the classroom, and we are not yet sure how many we will have in class. We are prepared to teach forty students, so have a team of five Americans and one Colombian who speaks English well. The lady who is coordinating our week with the Secretario has asked what we might need and is anxious to provide the best available classroom for us. She has closely coordinated with our Colombian partner to make everything ready for us.

And then we arrive. The classroom is small but adequate. We had planned to form five small groups for practice and activities and can fit that many in. We have a large whiteboard and plenty of walls for mounting our posters and student work. Forty student desks are in the room already, and more are available. Then our students start arriving. We register them, assigning each to a small group and guide them to their group leader. Five, ten, and then fifteen come until we have a room full. Others come in all day long until we have the forty we can manage. Thankfully we get no more. Looking around the room I see we have a diverse group that includes six indigenous persons. Two young ladies are not teachers but are from the indigenous village, and two others are from the tourism office, sent by the mayor to improve their English skills. And we begin.

I offer a short introduction about the purpose, methods and length of our classes. We will come four times during the coming year to help them with pronunciation, grammar usage and speaking skills as well as to give

them some new teaching methods and activities to use in their classrooms. There is a sense of anticipation and wonder in the classroom. I ask if there are any questions before we begin. One man raises his hand and asks, "Why are you here? Why our town and our schools?" I tell him that we had already conducted English language training in the larger town not far away the year before. But I sense he wants to know what motived this team to come to this small town and do this for them. So I say, "Honestly, we believe our church was called by God in response to prayer to come to this town and offer you this opportunity. We are here because we want to be obedient to Him and serve you." The second question comes quickly after my answer, "Did you pay for this yourselves?" And the answer is "Yes, we did, and we have found that God has been generous to provide what we need to be able to come."

Our home church is with an average attendance of between forty and fifty people per week. Yet we have been called to partner with an International Mission Board missionary and two local Colombian pastors to open doors to the Gospel in this part of Colombia. The ultimate goal is to reach the unreached people group, an indigenous tribe, with the Gospel. We know we probably will not do much direct evangelization, but because we come and teach some members of the tribe along with the teachers, the door has been opened. The local churches have been invited in to share stories from the Bible and to develop relationships. We have been invited to come for meals and celebrations in the village. When we come, we are welcomed as honored guests. And now there are believers in the tribe.

We already have more invitations to come to other towns and other villages to teach. Word has spread that some norteamericanos are coming to teach English for free, so other teachers and students want our help. Most of the teachers we have been working with have never spoken English with a North American before. They may read well, but are often very weak in speaking and writing. They have hundreds of questions and are eager to learn and practice with us. Our break times are filled with individuals who want to learn more, practice more, and hear more English.

We all grow in our relationship with each other. We teach our students about our culture, and they teach us about theirs. We grow to care deeply for them as they accept us in warm friendships. Other people we deal with in town, from the copy shop to the restaurants, are warm and welcoming, glad to be of help to us.

And the two local churches, both located in other towns, are just as warm and welcoming. We are invited to worship, to preach, and to share in their churches as brothers and sisters in Christ. They are anxious to have us return so they can tell us about what God has been doing there to build the kingdom since our last visit. The truth is, I really do not know who is blessed more because of our relationship. We go home singing praises to God for His generosity in allowing us to participate in His work. Everyone who has gone comes back wanting to return. We are not doing anything difficult. Matt and I (we co-pastor our church) lead the overall teaching. We are both retired educators and teaching is what we have done for years. Those who go with us work closely with small groups of teachers to lead practice and learning activities that do not require any great teaching experience. Yet the outcome is rich with growth in language and in relationships. In our second year of teaching we are in a new location but are working with the same indigenous tribe. We look forward to see where God will take us next.



Opportunities for Teachers Overseas Through CBF

Many opportunities are available through CBF. The following are examples:

English Teacher Northern Thailand (Musikee) This assignment is in a very rural boarding school in a Karen village. The school has about 700 students, ranging from age 5 to 18, covering all grade levels. The ideal candidate will hold a Bachelors' Degree, be a native English speaker and have prior teaching experience (TESL experience would be helpful). Length: Minimum of 20 week school term.

English Teacher Bangkok area of Thailand (Nang Mon, Chonburi Province) This assignment is for an English teacher to work with 4th to 12th grade students. The school, located in Bangkok, is a boarding school of primarily Thai and Chinese students. Being a boarding school, teachers are required to become part of the community. Most of the teachers live on campus in school housing and form a nice Christian community to be a part of. A Bachelor's Degree is required and teaching experience, particularly with children of varied nationalities, is a plus. A single or a couple can be considered for this assignment. Length: Minimum of an academic year (May – March)

China ESL Teachers-

Working through the Chinese government to place ESL teachers in impoverished areas of the country These are paid



positions through the TIP program. More information is on the CBF web site.

Chongqing, China English Teacher in School for the Blind,

An individual is needed to teach English in the Chongqing School for the Blind. In addition to teaching visually impaired students, the individual will provide training and/or conversation practice for teaching staff (sighted). Teaching experience, TESOL experience or training required. When: Ongoing Length: 2-6 months. More information is on the CBF web site.

Romania. Help CBF Field Personnel Ralph and Tammy Stocks work with the Romany people. The Ruth School offers 1st-8th grade studies for Romany children. Summertime provides the opportunity for VBS camps. Construction teams, teacher appreciation helpers and sewing and craft workers are also needed. Southern Spain. CBF Field Personnel Joel and Tiffne Whitley work among the immigrant community in Roquetas, Spain. Individuals are needed to work with the "mi casa" ministry space to engage local residents through a variety of social and spiritual outreach ministries. Individuals

may teach sewing, Bible and discipleship classes. Opportunities are also available to work with cultural exchange cooking programs, a coffee/tea house and even the development of media pieces. Greece. CBF Field Personnel Bob and Janice Newell lead PORTA as a spiritual and cultural center for Albanian immigrants in the heart of Athens, Greece. Albanians are exposed to cultural


